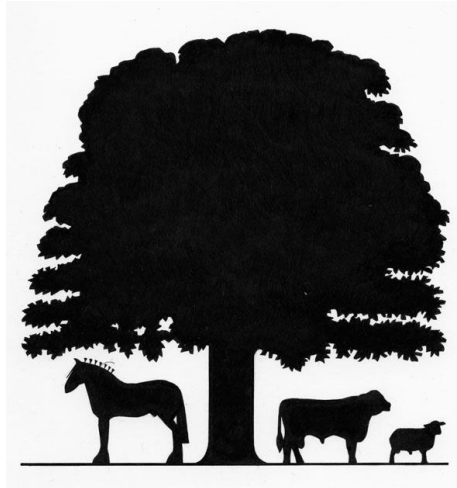

GENERAL INFORMATION

Schedules & entry forms can be found on the Kington Show website - www.kingtonshow.co.uk & from various outlets including the Grapevine, the Kington Tourist Information Office and the Kington NFU Office. Entries must be made to the Secretary or they may be received at the Kington NFU Office.

Exhibitors staging numbers will be forwarded ONLY if a stamped addressed envelope is included with the entry form. Otherwise, they should be collected from the Horticultural Secretary on the morning of the show.

Please note: All exhibits must be staged by 10am on the morning of the show and may not be removed before 5pm.

ALL PERSONS ENTERING THE SHOWGROUND MUST PAY THE ENTRY FEE. This will be refunded if you leave the showground before 10am.

Trophies & special prizes will be presented at 4.30pm in the Horticultural Marquee & all prize money will be paid out immediately after the presentation and before 6pm on show day. Any monies not collected by 6pm will be forfeited

We meet 4 or 5 times a year at the Burton Hotel and always welcome new committee members.

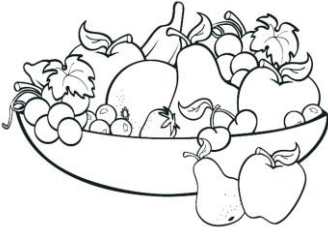

Mrs EM Lloyd Memorial Challenge Trophy will be awarded for the most points in classes 133-137 (9-12 years classes)

Given Recipe

Class 63 Vegan Victoria Sponge

Ingredients

For the Cake

450g self-raising flour
150g soft light brown sugar
150g caster sugar
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
400 ml vegan milk
175 ml vegetable oil
2 tsp vanilla extract
1 tbsp white wine vinegar

For the Decoration

150g vegan butter
350g icing sugar
1 tsp vanilla extract
200g jam of your choice
12 whole strawberries

Pre heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan and line two 20cm cake tins with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, mix the flour, brown sugar, caster sugar, baking powder and bicarbonate of soda together until combined. Add the vegan milk, vegetable oil, vanilla extract and white wine vinegar and stir until combined. Divide the mixture between the two tins. Bake in the oven for 35-45 minutes. Leave to cool fully in the tins.

Decoration

In a large bowl, beat the vegan butter to soften it. Add the icing sugar and vanilla extract and beat until combined. Take the first sponge and spread half of the buttercream onto the cake. Spread the jam over the top. Top with the other sponge and spread the rest of the buttercream over the top. Decorate with the strawberries.

RULES:

1: This section shall be governed by a sub-committee elected by the members of the Society in General Meeting each year and in accordance with the Rules of the Society.

2: Every exhibit must be the bone-fide property of and grown by the exhibitor or made and produced by the exhibitor with the exception of classes 46-51. This rule will be strictly enforced and exhibitors infringing this rule will be disqualified, and all entry fees & prize money will be forfeited.

3: Specimens forming part of a collective may NOT be exhibited in any other class.

4: The prize money will be awarded at the discretion of the committee in conjunction with the judge & the right is reserved to alter or withdraw any prizes if sufficient merit has not been shown, or if sufficient merit is not forthcoming or otherwise, at their absolute discretion.

5: No exhibitor shall be allowed to take home more than 1 prize in any 1 class.

6: The committee reserve the right to inspect any garden at any time, and they have the power to refuse any entry.

7: If there are fewer than 5 entries in any one class, the 3rd prize money may be withheld.

8: The decision of the Committee and the judge should be final as to merit. Any objection may be made in writing to the secretary, by 2pm on the day of the show, and must be accompanied by a deposit of £5 which will be refunded if the objection is sustained.

9: Specimens for exhibition must be staged before 10am prompt on the day of the show. Specimens sent after this time will be rejected. The tent will be cleared for judging and re-open at 12.30pm approx. No exhibit may be removed before 5pm.

10: Competitors must bring their own vases, plates etc. for staging their own exhibits. The sub-committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage, but every care will be taken of all such equipment.

11: Trade exhibits: Items may be sold from exhibits which form part of a display & collected after 5pm.

12: All entries can be made on the enclosed entry form or by email to angeline.preece@aol.com, stating name, age (if under 18), address and no. & name of the classes entered.

13: Exhibitors may indicate that their exhibits are for sale, but the committee may not take part in any negotiations.

14: The points towards trophies will be awarded as follows: Three for 1st, two for 2nd & one for 3rd, when applicable.
